## **NATURE PHOTOS**

Check out the winning photographs in **Your Best Shots**, **pages 4–5**. Ask students to identify something in each picture that impresses them. Perhaps the photo captures an interesting behavior, tells a story, or makes them feel a certain way. Or maybe the photo's lighting, colors, or overall composition is particularly strong.

If students have access to cameras, suggest they spend half an hour photographing nature in their own backyards, schoolyard, or a local park. Distribute copies of the Photo Shoot student page and have children use it to document two of their favorite pics. Set aside class time for students to share their nature photographs and documentation. Then suggest children enter their favorite shots in *Ranger Rick's* ongoing photo contest at <a href="mailto:nwf.org/rrphotocontest">nwf.org/rrphotocontest</a>. ### 50<sup>™</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF EARTH DAY

Commemorate Earth Day's 50th anniversary by reading "50 Ways to Love the Earth," pages 6–15. Then encourage students to do their part to protect and restore their planet by taking action on some of the 50 Earthfriendly suggestions listed in the article. Below are more Earth Day activities:

- Create homemade anniversary cards containing Earth-friendly messages. Display them on a bulletin board titled "Happy 50th, Earth!"
- **2.** Have students write personal pledges of environmental commitment, using Ranger Rick's Pledge on page 27 for inspiration. Children could then display their pledges on plaques or posters.
- **3.** As a class, outline a plan for attracting wildlife to your schoolyard. To get animals to drop by or move

in, your schoolyard habitat with need to provide:

- Food: anything from a simple bird feeder to a garden full of native plants with nectar-filled flowers, berries, and/or seeds
- Water: a birdbath or shallow dish of water for birds, or a small pond for frogs or other water creatures
- **Shelter:** brush piles, stone walls, bushes, bat boxes, and/or trees
- Place to Raise Young: bird houses and/or leafy plants (for insects)

#### **HAPPY TRAILS**

If reading "Let's Hike!" on pages 28–32, inspires your students to hit the trail, plan a class hike. Have students help (1) choose the destination, (2) look at a map to plan the route, and (3) make a list of what to wear and pack. While on the trail, be sure to follow the Tips for Happy Hikers on page 32. Also on page 32 is a checklist of nature items to search for while hiking. Distribute copies of the list before you start out and invite children to check off items as they spot them.
